## **BS600 Orientation to Biblical Studies**

Description	This course will introduce students to academic tools and methods used to study the Bible, thus preparing students for future Bible courses and other theological study at the Ecumenical Institute. The course will focus on topic related to biblical study including: 1) the development and contents of the biblical canon; 2) the transmission and growth of biblical literature; 3) methods and tools for biblical study; and, 4) the exegetical process.	
Requirements	Reading - Students should expect to read at most 800 pages of required reading and should be prepared to discuss readings in class.  Writing – Five short writing assignments (2-3 pages each) and one final exegesis paper (10–12 pages) for a course total of 20-27 pages.
