Requirements	Reading: secondary reading will include two commentaries (one in common, one selected by the student), a small monograph, and the instructor's own commentary-in-progress, totaling about 900–1,000 pages.
	Writing: one one-page paper, one 4-page book review (1,400 words), and one 12-page paper (4,000 words), for a total of about 17 pages
	Other Assignments: weekly manuscript analysis of the text of 1 Corinthians (marking up the text of the letter)
