THE MORAL AND SPIRITUAL VISION OF WENDELL BERRY

Description	This course will explore the essays, fiction, and poetry of one of America's finest living authors, Wendell Berry. We will consider the moral, spiritual, social, and ecological dimensions in the thought of this singular and prolific writer. Special attention will be devoted to themes of embodiment, health, food, community, peacemaking, creaturely limits, and care of the land. Inclass activities will include close reading of texts, group discussion, video/slide programs, conversations with guest speakers, and student presentations.
Requirements	Reading: Students should expect to read fewer than 900 pages from the required texts, supplemented by short additional readings, including brief essays, poems, and critical assessments.
	 Writing: Students will be required to submit: single page, written reflections on the weekly reading assignments with at least one question for class discussion, a 4-6 page mid-semester essay (details TBD), and a 10-12 page essay on the topic of their class presentation.
	Other Assignments: In our final class session(s), each student will lead a fifteen-minute presentation on a teacher-approved topic relevant to the work of Wendell Berry.
