Course Description

An exploration of the varieties of spirituality—the lived experience of Christian faith—found in the New Testament and their relevance for contemporary Christian life and mission.

Prerequisites: BS600 and BS622 (or equivalents) recommended, but not required

Course Requirements

Students will be required to read no more than 850 pages and write no more than 18 pages.

- 1. Careful study of the texts and of Scripture.
- 2. Consistent and intelligent class contributions based on study of the texts and Scripture. (20%)
- 3. One one-page discussion starter based on the assigned reading for a particular class session. Copies for all members of the class should be brought to class and placed on Canvas. (10%)
- 4. One reflection paper of approximately 1,500 words on either Bonhoeffer, Hogan, or King. (25%).
- 5. A final research and reflection paper of approximately 3,500 to 4,000 words on one of the following (35%):
 - a. Aspects of the spirituality of one book of the New Testament and its contemporary significance.
 - b. A specific theme in spirituality (e.g., prayer) in one New Testament book and its contemporary significance.
 - c. A specific theme (e.g., prayer) across several different New Testament books and its contemporary significance.
 - d. A book review of a significant book in New Testament spirituality and its contemporary significance.

Notes:

- Students for whom this is there very first E.I. course will only need to write 2,500 to 3,000 words for the final paper.
- Topics must be approved by the instructor in advance. Papers will be due approximately two weeks after the end of the course.
- 6. A short class presentation on the final paper. (10%)
