Course Number & Name: TH653 Science Looks at Faith & Health (1 credit)

Instructors: Drs. Joel Shuman & Brian Volck

Course Description: In this course we'll theologically investigate the so-called "Faith and Health" movement, which includes a range of attempts to correlate health with faith and to study that correlation scientifically. We will look at the movement's origins in the last third of the 20th century and its antecedents in orthodox and heterodox Christianity; its more recent forms, including the nascent field of psychoneuroimmunology; and its prospects for the near future. Students will be asked to think and write critically about the movement with respect to their own vocations as health professionals, pastors, and chaplains. The course will build on students' learning in CONNECT Module One, "Text and Tradition" (TH651).
