TH 654 Medicine and Morality: Christian Tradition and the Changing Shape of Curing and Caring (CONNECT Module Four)

Schedule: January 19-20, February 16-17, and March 15-16, 2024.

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Description: According to Plato, "the goal of medicine is not the good of medicine, but the good of the body." In this course we'll explore what it means for modern scientific medicine to pursue the "good of the body" and ask what difference a Christian account of the body and its goods might make in how medicine is practiced and used. We'll attend especially to the ways the Christian practice and use of medicine might lead us to think about some of the common moral questions attending contemporary medicine.
