

BS621 Literature & Theology of the Hebrew Bible

Description	This course will serve as an introduction to theological concepts found in the Torah, Prophets, and Writings, as well as their historical and social contexts, with consideration of critical methodology and major themes. The goal of the course is to help students become familiar with contents of the Hebrew Bible, to read texts critically, and to engage thoughtfully with theological themes in the Hebrew Bible and their ethical implications for contemporary Christian practice.
Requirements	Reading: Approximately 750 pages textbook and articles on Canvas, in addition to readings from study Bible.
	Writing: 2 reflections (1.5 pages each) on assigned articles; 2 short exegetical papers (3-4 pages each); 1 final exegetical paper (12-15 pages) for a total of 25 pages.
	Other Assignments: 4 online quizzes (open book; time limited); 'Start-your-own' discussion boards; in-class presentation of reflection on assigned articles
